1. Worship

We are very privileged at St John's to have a congregation made up of all ages and our worship reflects this. On the first Sunday in the month we have a thriving 9:30am All Age service, which is averaging over 50 people and is attracting some new families. We have many involved in leading the music at this service and the cajón drum is a most welcome recent addition. Also on the first Sunday is the traditional BCP service, much valued by those who enjoy the traditional language and format.

On other Sundays, we aim to have a balance between the organ and band and I am very grateful to the Blays who head up the contemporary music on the second and fourth Sundays in the month. It is very encouraging to see Annabel Standen gain in confidence with her involvement on the third Sunday (as well as the other musicians too, of course). Great thanks also go to Jean Turner for her excellent organ playing and leading of our wonderful choir.

It is also encouraging to see some newer people getting involved in sidespeople duties, cleaning, serving refreshments and reading and praying.

Central to our time together is receiving from God as we sit under the authority of his Word. 2015 saw us spend time in the first 6 chapters of Mark's Gospel, the letter of 1 Peter, parables of Jesus, the book of Proverbs and Jesus' teaching about his return at the end of the age. God's word feeds us spiritually and it is important to spend time hearing from him – "All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness" (2 Timothy 3:16).

In 2015 we improved our audio-visual facilities. No more do we have to work round a projector on a trolley in the middle of the dais. Instead the new projector, along with the TV screens, enables all to see song words, video clips and sermon presentations clearly.



We enjoyed a number of special services in 2015 – starting with a new evening service to mark Epiphany (thank you, Miriam) through Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday and Good Friday, to Time to Remember and Christmas (to name a few). People continue to be blessed by our services of Healing and Wholeness and it was wonderful to welcome Battisford Praise Band for an excellent time of praise and worship in September.

Many thanks to all who make St John's such a welcoming and godly place of worship. It is my hope and prayer that we will feel the touch of God's Holy Spirit as we come to meet together to offer him our praise, our thanksgiving and, indeed, our very selves.

2. Youth & Children's Work

Children and youth work at St. John's takes place largely on Sunday mornings in term times during regular 10.30am services. A crèche is provided for the very young each week with toys and an adult supervisor. Explorers (4-9 years old) and Pathfinders (10 to 13 years old) meet in their own rooms. CYFA (14 to 18's) is a growing group with 8 or 9 regular attenders, which meets on Sunday evenings. It was great to see our young people have such an active part in the Good Friday service.

In addition to these regular times of teaching, SlamJam youth choir practice once a month on Saturday afternoons and have performed many times in 2015 - Mothering Sunday, the Fun Day in June, Harvest, Remembrance Sunday, the November concert and the Christmas Eve 3.30pm crib service. Many young people are involved in the 9.30am music group too.

The Explorers group, which has up to 7 members and 8 adult leaders (who operate on a termly rota), have looked at several books of the bible during the year including Samuel, Kings, Psalms, all the gospels and Acts. Sessions always include a fun opening introduction to the topic, a bible story and a way to encourage the children to use what they have learned in the days and weeks ahead, for example how God uses unexpected opportunities in our lives to tell people we know about Him.



In December, all the children and youth joined together in a session to enjoy a nativity play written for us by Pam Millyard, we learned how Jesus has paid the price for all of us - a great time was had by all involved.

We have also welcomed over 20 Beavers in February, where they learnt about baptism, the Lord's Supper and a Bible story, as well as enjoying some craft and refreshments. The primary school came in for their Harvest service and Little Elms for their Christmas Nativity. We are also privileged to go into the school for assemblies and as part of the Open the Book team.

Thanks to all who work so hard at St John's with young people, both in the church and in the community.

3. Prayer Life

All ladies are welcome to join us and a list is left in the church for folk to add their names. It is helpful to know how many will be present.

The latest CMS link letter from Tim Curtis in the Paraguayan Chaco paints the scene very well and there is clearly great excitement about the arrival of the bibles and also the latest oral recordings, painstakingly practised by 30 now competent readers who encompass many age groups.

We all need inspiration and trust, when things are slow to come to fruition, but surely there is a lesson for us all in this fine example of how to trust and obey God's leadership. It is the race for the best way to live that is offered to us, and at whatever pace it is worth running.
